Capital Futbol Club to support arts and education opportunities, particularly outside of school, 2022-23	Salem	\$22,500	Capital Futbol Club provides opportunities for youth to develop their individual skills in soccer. The program will provide age-appropriate athletic instruction and leadership development to help students develop their highest potential. CFC serves 2,700 Youth in Marion County annually between the ages of 5-18, 40% are Latinx students' who will benefit from the scholarship, giving them an opportunity to better their lives through the sport of soccer. CFC will partner with Portland Timbers, Willamette Academy, and the Grass Roots after school program
Falls City School District #57 to support early literacy and out of school time activities, 2022-23	Falls City	\$10,000	Falls City School District provides will partner with YMCA of Marion and Polk County to provide organized sports and leadership opportunities, as well as swim lessons, for at least 100 middle school students in the Falls City School District. The community will be empowered with resources to support the FACES swimming program and organized sports for a community that needs additional resources and support. Partnership includes the YMCA/FACES water safety program.
Independence Public Library to support early literacy and out of school time activities, 2022-23	Independence	\$16,000	The Independence Public Library will provide an early-learning and after school hub in the children's section of the library in Polk County. OCF funds will purchase two early literacy learning computers, two early literacy learning tablets, a circulating literacy collection, and furniture to create an area for patron use. We will make those programs available to our community members experiencing the opportunity gap (40% Latinx). Story times will be supplemented by the programs and games on the new computers and tablets, and our new collection of early literacy kits will circulate among our users (both Spanish and English). Once the grant period is complete, we will have a comfortable, welcoming space in the library where children and families from Marion, Polk and Yamhill counties are welcome to play and learn together. Partnerships include Friends of the Library group and the Migrant Summer School.
McMinnville School District #40 to support early literacy and out of school time activities, 2022-23	McMinnville	\$20,000	The McMinnville School District provides teaching, learning, academic enrichment and family engagement for students and families in Yamhill County. The Ready for Kindergarten (RK4) program's goal is to enable parents to become their first and best teacher through child development instructions and

material resources. RK4 will engage with parents and families of historically underserved children ages birth to five (60% native Spanish speakers). Parents will leave the workshops with books and toys targeted to their child's age along with a parenting manual. Partnerships for the RK4 program include

Rotary, Kiwanis, Yamhill County Community Care Organization, Yamhill Health Services and Head Start.

Stayton Public Library Foundation

to support early literacy and out of school time activities, 2022-23

The Stayton library Foundation raises funds to improve the Stayton Public Library's programs and services. The Foundation partners with Family Building blocks and Stayton Public Library to offer the Dolly Parton Imagination Library program for Idanha, Gates, and Detroit. The program will enable local children (ages 0-5) to build a home library (60 books in 5 years). Additional local community partnerships include Santiam School District, Head Start and the YMCA.

Willamina School District

to support early literacy and out of school time activities, 2022-23

The Willamina School District will implement Bulldog Pride: An after-school program for 90 rural middle and high schoolers that will focus on career and technical education with an emphasis on sustainable systems and honoring the earth. We anticipate reaching 20% of our middle and high school population, which will be 90 students (30% Native American students). Our program will be four days/week and will include snack and transportation for students in rural Willamina in Polk County. Bulldog Pride partners with local businesses: Skid INK, Skyberg Hardware and Havel Designs/Future Forestry Wood Productions and Angela Fasana (Education Department Chair, Confederated Tribe of the Grand Ronde). Partners will support with resources and skill building opportunities for the STEAM hour of Bulldog Pride.
